

by Helen Fields (£14.99 HB, Avon)

Set in a remote location, the Institution houses the most dangerous and deranged men on earth. Following the murder of a heavily pregnant nurse and the disappearance of her baby daughter, forensic profiler Dr Connie Woolwine is sent to investigate the case. Renowned for her ability to get inside a murderer's head, she must go undercover among murderers to find the baby girl before it's too late. This twisty, claustrophobic thriller is ideal for fans of *The Sanatorium*.

Strictly Friends by Frances Mensah Williams

When Ruby Lamont's six-year-old son, Jake,

begins to ask questions about his estranged father, she decides it's time she found out the truth, for both their sakes. Ruby sets off to the Caribbean to find Kenny, leaving behind Griffin, her best friend. Sparks fly as she confronts Kenny, and to add insult to injury, Griffin turns up out of the blue, seemingly with more on his mind than offering moral support! With believable characters and a strong and somewhat stubborn protagonist, this is a well-drawn and delightful story of love, loss and friendship, perfect for fans of Tessa Bailey.

Soon her work takes her to a newly built store in Kent and with it the chance of marriage. But can Betty ever forget the promise she made to Charlie? This nostalgic story transports the reader back in time, with warm characters and a hint of romance.

Suspicious strangers arrive at the farm asking for help and Aida and her family have heartbreaking decisions to make. Compelling, unsettling and emotive, this is an exciting story of survival and self-discovery.



CRIME FICTION

Her Deadly Game by Robert Dugoni (£8.99, Thomas & Mercer)

When Keera Duggan's career as a Seattle prosecutor is compromised after an affair with a senior colleague ended badly, she returns to her family's failing criminal defence law firm to work for her father. She's hoping to restore the firm's reputation, her relationship with her father and her career. When Keera's hired to defend an investment adviser accused of killing his wife, the prosecutor they face is an old flame of hers, and eager to destroy her defence in court. But as a former chess prodigy, she is confident that she can outmanoeuvre him. This intelligent thriller has well-drawn characters, a super plot!
